

Taking GCSEs and A-Levels whilst Electively Home Educated (EHE)

Where Can I Sit an Exam as a Private Candidate?

When you are home educated, if you have chosen to sit public exams it will be as an external (also known as private) candidate. You will need to find a registered exam centre accredited with the exam board you have chosen to use. Exam centres can be difficult to find. However, if you contact the examinations officer at your local high school you may find that they are currently willing to accept external candidates. The situation can change yearly. In most cases, a school where a young person may have attended previously, will be the most likely school to support by offering the opportunity to sit examinations as an external candidate.

Please be aware that the arrangements for your child to sit their exams as an external candidate should be made as soon as possible and no later than the beginning of November to avoid additional administration costs. Please also be aware that some settings will have limited places available.

Some independent schools will take external candidates to sit their exams. As with all schools the fees are dependent on the exam, exam board and any administration fees that the schools themselves identify. In all cases, please contact the school directly for further information.

The Suffolk County Council Elective Home Education team and the Education, Skills and Learning team are all aware that finding centres where external candidates can take examinations has been difficult in the county. We are pleased to be able inform you that Unity School have offered their services as exam centres. SENDAT have offered to be an exam centre for pupils with additional needs.

The team will support home educating families wherever possible. If there are any updates about examination centres, these will be shared with families and put on the SCC EHE website.

How Old Must I be to Take Exams?

There is no specified age to sit GCSEs / iGCSEs and you can begin studying for GCSEs and IGCSEs when your child is ready. You may want to stagger the exams, so consider beginning when your child is around 13 years of age.

Where Do I Start?

You will need to contact the relevant exam boards that offer the GCSEs / iGCSEs for which you would like to study. Exam boards publish a syllabus and subject specification for all GCSEs and iGCSEs. Often the exam board will publish their own student book which covers the whole syllabus.

How Much Does it Cost?

As an external candidate you are responsible for all exam costs which will include the costs of study, registering with an exam centre and sitting the exams. You may

find that the cost varies locally depending on which exam centres you are able to use.

Children and Young People With Additional Needs

Some students with Special Educational Needs and/or a disability may qualify for adjustments with exams, these are known as ‘**access arrangements**’ and you can read the full regulations and guidance that settings must consider on the [JCQ \(Joint Council for Qualifications\) website](https://www.jcq.org.uk/).

Access Arrangements are pre-examination adjustments for candidates based on evidence of need and normal way of working. Access Arrangements fall into two distinct categories: some arrangements are delegated to centres, others require prior JCQ awarding body approval.

If you believe your child may qualify talk to school, this will usually be with the SENCO or the examinations lead. Consider whether you have any school, specialist or medical reports that might help to evidence any adjustments.

Other Ways to Sit Formal Examinations

West Suffolk College Elective Home Education (Year 10 and 11)

(Please note that EHE 14 to 16 programmes are for years 10 and 11)

WSC offer a range of subjects for Year 10 and 11 EHE pupils. They have one start date a year in September and are usually oversubscribed, so it is a good idea to apply early. <https://www.wsc.ac.uk/find-a-course/elective-home-education>

All sessions are 3 hours each with a break in the middle. Morning sessions runs from 09:15-12:15 and afternoon sessions run from 13:15-16:15.

- Maths (Functional Skills or GCSE)
- English (Functional Skills or GCSE)
- History GCSE
- Computer Science GCSE
- OCR Combined Science
- Introduction to Motor Vehicle Industries Entry level 3/Level 1
- Introduction to Hair & Beauty Entry level 3/Level 1
- Introduction to Hospitality and Catering Level 1
- Performance Music and Media Level 1
- Music Level 2 Art & Design Level 1

Students can choose to stay with the College and access the 16+ provision, others may go on to Apprenticeships or Scholarships. The tutors/support team will help students with choices, application and preparation for the next steps.

Catch 22 – Great Yarmouth

Catch 22 are a small college based in Great Yarmouth who take EHE pupils from 14 to 16 (years 9, 10 and 11), although they take students up to the age of 19 years and EHE students can stay with them up until the age of 19 years if they wish to. The college welcomes any EHE children who are keen to learn regardless of their school history.

Catch 22 offers Functional Skills (Levels 1-3) in English and Maths and alongside this students also do PSHE, a vocational subject (currently offering a choice of Health and Social Care (level 1-2) or Travel and Tourism (level 1-2)), a weekly employability lesson and work experience. They also offer an enrichment morning which gives students the opportunity to ask for additional help with their studies and participate in team building activities to strengthen social skills.

Currently, students either attend on Mondays and Tuesdays with a half day on Friday or Wednesdays and Thursdays with a half day on Friday.

Catch 22 accepts pupils with an EHCP if they are able to meet need but are unable to offer 1-1 provision.
