Mock Interviews: Classroom session

Preparing for a mock interview

Use the STAR technique to answer some common interview questions:

S - Explain	the Situation. Something that has happened . This could be when you were on work experience, an activity at school, a volunteer position, or any other relevant event. Be as specific as possible.
T – Task	Next, describe your task or responsibility in that situation. Perhaps you had to help your group complete a project, get over a disagreement with a someone or use your initiative to solve a problem.
A – Action	You then describe how you completed the task. Focus on what YOU did, rather than what your team or others. (Tip: Instead of saying, "We did," say "I did")
R – Result	Finally, explain the outcomes or results. It may be helpful to highlight what you achieved or what you learned.

Have a few key points to talk about – this could be what you enjoy at school or in your spare time, what you hope to do in the future, what you are good at. But don't tell them your whole life story!




