There is only room for grants to one or two newcomers each year. It gives grants to mainly Oxfordshire and West Suffolk charities, towards specific projects rather than core costs / general expenses. It operates through registered (or exempt) charities and no donations are made directly to individuals.  Applications (with bank details) are accepted from 1st December to 15th February annually. Colchester Catalyst Charity	Health and Wellbeing: Pump-priming funding to kick-start new projects #Post code Areas: CO  Colchester Catalyst Charity is a grant making trust that offers financial assistance for local Charitable/CIC organisations and individuals with health problems within the CO post code area.  We like to fund new projects that can help to address a gap in healthcare provision in the local area. This could include setting up new services to support older people who feel lonely; young people with learning disabilities and other mental health problems; and people who are suffering from long-term health conditions who are currently not assisted enough by the statutory services.  We also fund equipment, such as specialist medical devices and items that can play a big role in improving people's health, such as OT machines.  Our budget for the whole of this year was set at £450,000, and we offer grants usually between £5,000 - £25,000.
